Dr. Connie L. Scarborough, Medieval Spanish Literature expert and professor at Texas Tech University, gives two plenary lectures at the 54th Congress of the Canadian Association of Hispanists in Regina.

Connie L. Scarborough is a professor in the Department of Classical and Modern Languages, Texas Tech University, Ph.D. in 1983 by University of Kentucky, member of the executive council of the Forum on Medieval Iberian Languages, Literatures and Cultures of the Modern Language Association (MLA) and editor-in-chief, Spanish division, of *Rocky Mountain Review*.

Scarborough is an expert of the Spanish Literature and Language during the Medieval period. Among other publications, she is the author of *Inscribing the Environment: Ecocritical Approaches to Medieval Spanish Literature* (Berlin and Boston: De Gruyter, 2013); of *A Holy Alliance: Alfonso X's Political Use of Marian Poetry* (Newark, Delaware: Juan de la Cuesta, 2009); and co-editor with Albrecht Classen (University of Arizona) of *Crime and Punishment in the Middle Ages and Early Modern Period* (Berlin and Boston: De Gruyter, 2012).
